

Youth Service recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities as RYLA ,Rotaract and Interact , service projects, and creating international understanding with Rotary Youth Exchange.

Rotary International Council of Legislation (CoL) on April 28, 2010 has recognized the youths in Rotary by approving enactment to add "New Generation" as the Fifth Avenue of Service. The CoL of 2013 had made an amendement to change the name from "New Generation" to "Youth Service".

A brief account of activities 1959-2019 Rotary Club of Kathmandu

1959 Gen. Kiran SJB Rana was installed as the president

Rotary club of Kathmandu (sponsored by RC Darbhanga, India, District 325) was chartered on April 13, 1959 and admitted into Rotary International under the District 325.

The Charter of the Rotary Club of Kathmandu (RCK) was presented on Sunday, June 28, 1959 in the presence of king Mahendra at the Army Hall. There were 30 Charter member, Gen. Kiran SJB Rana served as Charter President for three consecutive years.

-During the meeting Rotary Club of Kathmandu proposed a school for the visually impaired students and the then Prime Minister announced the establishment of a school for visually impaired students at kirtipur, Nepal.

-Dance and drama were performed by artists of Tagore's Sura Mandir institute of dance and drama, Calcutta to collet fund for the Blind School from November 25-29 and the proceeds were handed over to Government of Nepal to run the school. King Mahendra had arranged for the air transport of the artists in his private plane, and made arrangement for lodging and boarding in Kathmandu.

1962-63 Kumar Das Shrestha was installed as the President.

- -To observe the U.N. day variety entertainment program was organized on October 24.
- -King Mahendra contributed Rs.1 lac to purchase land and construct Rotary Building with a big hall.

1963 Gen Arjun SJB Rana was installed President.

1964-65 Gopal Raj Bhandari was installed president.

-RCK organized an eye camp at the Bharat Darshan Exhibition Hall at Sano Tundikhel on March 19,1966. More than seven thousand patients were benefited. King Mahendra visited the camp and encouraged Rotarians for more service projects at community.

1966-67 Manindra Raj Shrestha was installed as the president.

-On March 4, 1967, first district conference was organized at the Exhibition Ground. The then District 325 Comprised of clubs of East India (then east Pakistan), Nepal and Burma.King Mahendra as the Chief Guest attended the conference and addressed the participant.

-On October 4, Dallu Village near Swayambhu was adopted by RCK. 500 books were given to start a library. 400 fruit tree saplings were planted in the village. Later annual salary of a school teacher was also given to the village.

1967-68 M. Ranunny was installed as the President.

-King Mahendra inagurated the Rotary Building on May 11, 1969. RCK became the 13th Club in the whole world to have its own building. –The Rotary Anns established Inner Wheel Club in1969, sponsored by RCK with founder President Mrs. Kamala Rajbhandari. In collaboration with inner Wheel Club, RCK started running a weekly children's clinic, providing service of a pediatrician and free medicines.

- -The Inner Wheel club also started international cooking classes for expatriate women.
- -A Rotary Technical Scholarship was awarded to a school for higher study at abroad.
- -A donation of RS. 5,000 was sent to Pakistan relief Fund.

1969-70 Mani Harsha Jyoti was installed as the President.

1970-71 Gulab S. Harjani was installed as the President.

1971-72 Ranjit K. Ghosh was installed as the President.

1972-73 A Scordialos was installed as the President.

1973-74 Raj Krishna Shrestha was installed as the President.

1974-75 Prem Prakash Shrestha was installed as the President.

1975-76 Tom C. Mendies was installed as the President.

-RCK organized District Conference in Kathmandu on April 9-11. The program was attended by 500 Rotarians from Bhutan, Burma, Bangladesh, India and host Nepal. The participants included RI President Ernesto Imbassahy de Mellow and DG lftekharul Alam.

1976-77 Jaya Kumar Nath Shah was installed as the President.

-RCK sponsored Rotary Club of Biratnagar the second Rotary club in Nepal and first one in the terai region. Former Prime Minister Nagendra Prasad Rijal became the Charter President of the club.

1977-78 Hulas Chand Golchha was Installed as the President.

-RCK in cooperation with Rotary Clubs of Saitama, provided assistance and support to Nepal Anti TB Association for TB control and construction of NATA Building/ sanatorium at Kalimati under WCS project 858/859.

1978-79 Ranjit K. Ghosh was installed as the President

-Support and assistance to TB control continued.

1979-80 Dr. Jogendra Jha was installed as the President

- RCK started contributing Rs. 5000 monthly to Bir Hospital for the needy patients at the Emergency ward.
 - -Support to TB control through Nepal Anti TB Association continued.

1980-81 Kuber P. Sharma was installed as the President

- Support to TB control project continued.

1981-82 Dr. Jogendra Jha was installed as the President.

- -RCK started second World Community Service Project no. 1552. This project focused on helping TB patients of Nepal through Nepal Anti Tuberculosis Association and to help leprosy patients through Nepal Leprosy Relief Association. Japan contributed significantly for this project. Rotary Club of Saitama played a major role in TB control program in Nepal. Provide custodial care and impart education were the main features of the project.
- -Rs.15000 was contributed annually for the rehabilitation and another RS 15000 for children's education.
- -Construction works of Nepal's first Children Park at Bhirkuti Mandap was initiated in cooperation with embassy of India.

1982-83 Soli R. Manekshaw was installed as the President

1983-84 Ratna Man Sakya was installed as the President

(Vice President Kunj Bihari took over the charge as acting president after Ratna Man left for the USA)

- -US\$1000 was donated to anti-TB Association.
- -Vocational Award was given to lady Traffic Officer and best trainer .
- -RCC Shikoku, Japan sponsored 2 nurses for training for 9 months.
- Water Supply Project at Manikhel VDC of Lalitpur .
- -Sri Krishna Madhyamik Vidyalaya Building at Dapakhel and Mahalaxmi Campus building at Lubhu, Lalitpur were completed under the grant provide by USC Canadian in 1983 (under SSNCC).
- -A cheque of Rs.50,000 was handed over to Ms. Christina for the medical support of emergency ward at Bir Hospital and arrangement was made to donate Rs. 5000 monthly for several years .
- -Enquiry counter was established at Bir Hospital and salary of Telephone operator was also donated.
- -Rotary Club of Kathmandu celebrate its Silver Jubilee 11-14 April 1984. Queen Aishwarya inaugurated the celebration on April 11.
- -A cheque of Rs. 75000 was handed to Leprosy Relief Association . The amount was collected from Runa Laila Musical Night Charity show at Royal Nepal Academy Hall.
- -Beds and matress were donated to Kanti Hospital.

1984-85 Kunj Bihari Prasad Singh was installed as the President

- -Arrangement was made to donate one third of the amount of rent collected from Rotary Hall, renting to Inner Wheel to run three Children's Clinics: Bhimsen Gola, Baneshwor, Balaju and Gue Tole Patan.
- -Rotary Club of Biratnagar (RCK sponsored)sponsored Rotary Club of Dharan and was charted on June 12, 1985

1985-86 Murari SJB Rana was installed as President

- -Mrs Amira Dali was sent to Japan for nurses training .
- -PP Gopal Raj Bhandari became Polio Plus Committee Chairman .
- -Rotary Club of Kathmandu sponsored Rotary Club of Patan on August 9, 1985.
- -Salyansthan became the first Rotary Village Corps (RVC) of Nepal . Sri Krishna Dahal became the first RVC chairman.

1986-87 Kazuo Kaneko (Ambassador of Japan) was installed as the President



Response to Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Nepal Project

Responding to the health emergency created by COVID-19, Rotary Club of Kathmandu has established a "COVID-19 response fund" to support government and front line workers to fight against pandemic. With the financial and technical support of club members, cooperating partners and international Rotary clubs especially Rotary Club of Northbridge NSW, Sydney, District 9685, Disaster Aid Australia (DAA), Rotary Club of South WaggaWagga RID 9705, Rotary Club of The Entrance RID 9685, Rotary Club of Albury RID 9790, Rotary club of Crows Nest, Rotary club of Lane Cove, Rotary Club of Chatswood Sunrise, different relief package distribution, hand washing station establishment at hospitals, health care centres and public spaces, swab collection booth handover and awareness program were conducted. In total support of around \$15,000 has been provided till this reporting period.



At the beginning, Rotary Club of Kathmandu jointly with Panchakanya Group handover two sets of swab collection booths to the Ministry of Health and Population in the presence of Hon. Health Minister Mr.BhanubhaktaDhakal and Hon. Women, Children, and Senior Citizen Minister Mr.ParbatGurung.

Similarly, in coordination with Rotary club of Dhulikhel one unit of Swab collection booth was provided to Dhulikhel Quarantine centre to collect swab for PCR testing.



In addition, 5 sets of PPE has been provided to Sahodar Hospital of Lamjung district, 5 PPE set and 2 thermal gun to Telkot health post and Nagarkot health post. Medical items like Foley's catheter, CIC pipe, Urine bag, etc. were provided to lockdown hard-hit spinal injury persons residing at Nepal Disabled Association, Jorpati.

5000 Pcs mask, 20-liter hand washes liquid, 120 Pcs sanitizer, and 500 pair of hand gloves through Rotary club of Gongabu for the frontline health workers, security personnel and media persons working at Bhulke, Triyuga Municipality of Udaypur district.



Food relief package was provided to around 500 plus families, person with disabilities and orphans residing at different part of Kathmandu valley. Food packages were provided at EPSA Nepal (group of disabled women), Yangal club, newa Journalist, and child care home of Ombahal community, deprived communities at Bhaisepati, Lalitpur, needy community of Kathmandu metropolitan city ward no.11, Srijanshil Children Welfare Centre, Aasatit Child Home, deprived family of Devichaur, Godavari Municipality, and Blind Rocks.



Since handwashing with soap and water is the best way to stop transmission of coronavirus from hand, to break the chain of transmission mechanical handwashing stations were installed at public places like municipality offices, bus stations, and hospitals. In total twenty two units of mechanical handwashing stations has been installed at different places. Four units of mechanical handwashing station was installed at Nakkhu Jail, one unit at Maternity Hospital-OPD section at Bhaisepati, two units at Maternity Hospital Thapathali, two units at Patan Hospital Lagankhel, one unit at National Kidney Center, two





unit at Nepal Eye Hospital, one unit at Mulpani health center, one unit at BP Eye and Children Hospital, one unit at Sanga Spinal Injury Hospital, one unit at Tilganga Eye Hospital, one unit at PurnaMoti Memorial Society Ramechhap, two unit at Bir hospital, one unit at Sukraraj Tropical Hospital Teku, one unit at Badegaun Police Station Lalitpur, and one unit at Manmohan Hospital Swayambhu.

In collaboration with Radio Kathmandu 92.1 MHZ, Public Service Announcement (PSA) related to Coranavirus pandemic awareness is being broadcasted regularly from March to July 2020. Information about COVID 19, its symptoms, advice for being safe from infection, emergency contact numbers, etc. are being shared through PSA.





Rotary Global Grant #2098538 - Training Violence Against Women Advocates in Nepal

- Peace Area of Focus Grant: Humanitarian Project Nepal

The Kathmandu Rotary Club in Nepal and the Newberg Rotary Club in Oregon USA are working together on a Peace Global Grant to provide training to leaders already working hard in Nepal to prevent violence against women and girls.

Every family has a mom, a sister, a daughter, or a granddaughter. Every country faces the issue of safety for their women. In the United States, in Nepal, and around the globe, violence towards women exists. It exists everywhere, but we do not want to talk about this violence because it raises issues that we do not want to talk about. Rotary recognizes this. That is why the safety of women is included in the area of focus for peacebuilding and conflict prevention.

To our male Rotary colleagues, imagine if you died tomorrow and know that your wife and daughters won't get any inheritance – they will not be allowed to stay in your family home or continue the life that they had. They will not be kept safe and they may experience violence and social isolation. This law changed in Nepal in 2002. Just like the inheritance and domestic violence laws in Nepal, we want laws, policies, and services that keep women and girls safe, which can happen by advancing and fully implementing these laws.

Our two Rotary clubs, along with 21 other Rotary clubs from 3 countries have come together on this grant. The grant will train men and women on how to best equip the community and its leaders to create and follow the laws to protect women. Leaders already working as women's advocates will receive training in a manner that allows them to bring the information back to their organizations and communities. Capacity building and using the new skills to do ongoing education throughout Nepal is a very important part of this grant.


This is the first area-focused global grant in peacebuilding and conflict prevention for District 5100 and also for the RC Kathmandu. One of the features of this grant is that we initiated this grant as a 'Peacebuilder Club' as part of its mission to promote positive peace both in Nepal and across the globe. Furthermore, the primary co-operating organization for this grant 'Every Women Treaty' is a global campaign for an international treaty to end violence against women and girls and is itself a diverse coalition of women's rights advocates, scholars, lawyers, frontline practitioners and organizations working in more than 128 countries. In late 2018, Every Woman Treaty launched its public campaign as a global initiative to amplify the call for a treaty to end violence against women and girls. This GG 2098538 will essentially be linked to this global campaign.

All of the works being done in this grant will lead towards an independent, self-sustaining federation/coalition that advocates jointly advancing women's rights in Nepal contributing to the Sustainable Development Goal no. 5. This Federation will lead to the greater integration of women in decision making structures in Nepal, which is called out by the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1325 (UNSCR 1325) on Women, Peace and Security as vital for peace and security. The work in Nepal will contribute and be linked to the global Every Women Treaty campaign. Similar initiatives are being developed in Nigeria and Pakistan for which the need assessments are being conducted by Every women Treaty in these countries. The coalition in Nepal will later work with similar collation/federation that will come in to place in other countries to contribute to the global advocacy for violence against women ultimately advocating for a global treaty to curb VAW.

This worthwhile project will bring solutions to women and their families, knowing they can be safe without the threat of violence, and if violence does occur, there are resources to help them.

Global Earth Day Celebration

Since 1970 Global Earth Day celebration is the largest civic-focused day of the world. Celebration of 50th Anniversary of Earth Day on Wednesday 22April will unite hundreds of millions of people around the world to inspire an action against environmental degradation and climate changes even if it is online. Climate Action is the 2020 Earth Day. At the end of 2020, Nations will be expected to increase their national commitments to the 2015 Paris Agreement on climate change, so the time is now for all of us to call for greater global ambition to tackle our climate crisis for healthier ecosystems, more sustainable communities and a brighter future for all of us.



The Paris Agreement, in seeking to strengthen the global response to climate change, reaffirms the goal of limiting global temperature increase to well below 2 degrees Celsius, while pursuing efforts to limit the increase to 1.5 degrees Celsius. The Paris Agreement, signed in 2015, seeks to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees compared to pre-industrial levels. To reach that goal, the world would have to cut emissions by 7.6% annually to 2030. A 2 C warming would likely destroy around 13% of the world's ecosystems and summer temperatures would simply be unbearably hot. Earth has already warmed 1.1 C since pre-industrial times due to greenhouse gas emissions from burning coal, oil and gas.

Political interference still needs to clear to on undiluted point. President Donald Trump pulled out the United States out of the 2015 Paris climate accord. Trump has argued that the Paris agreement was a bad deal for the U.S. because reducing emissions would kill jobs and make energy more expensive but when it comes to sticking to the Paris Agreement, and all the members of G7 (Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, the United Kingdom, and the United States) wanted the same thing — all but one. Everybody wanted to take action except Trump.

Natural resources are the elements of nature that man can use and take advantage of. They represent source of wealth for the development of our societies. The best use of a natural resource depends on the knowledge that man has about it, and the laws that govern its conservation.. *What is the Corona Covid-19 Virus Really teaching us? Bill Gates said. "I am a strong believer that there is a spiritual purpose behind everything that happens, whether that is what we perceive as being good or being bad.

The Buddhist view of environment protection is grounded in the law of dependent origination. Nagarjun, a great Buddhist Scholar, explained in treatise on the Middle Way "There was never any phenomena that did not arise from conditionally". This means that nothing in the universe can exist independently, and all phenomena arise because of the culmination of various causes and conditions. In Nature, nothing exists alone ".

All species on earth are impacted by Climate Change. Since humans are assumed to be the most intelligent of the species, it is our responsibility to help bring our environment back to a healthy balance where every species can thrive and survive. Earth Day is important as it is an event of political activity and civic interest toward serving and preserving the earth.

Social Cohesion in the context of COVID-19 in Nepal

In early April 2020, a news media ran a sensational story suggesting that certain religious groups were plotting to spread the coronavirus in the communities. Hundreds of thousands of social media posts quickly amplified it, stoking religious violence. This led to rioting in parts of eastern Tarai, with the police having to resort to using force to bring the situation under control. The news report was fake - but the very fabric of social cohesion was shaken.

With widespread job losses and the looming prospect of hundreds of thousands of returning migrants, fake news of this nature will only play into people's frustration and anger. In the coming days and months, Nepal needs to brace for the bigger challenges of socio-economic recovery.

The pandemichas threatened to exacerbate the already existing inequality and instigate conflict, more so where certain communities and groups are exposed to stigma and discrimination. Besides the economic impact, the social impact can be widespread, long lasting and devastating for countries like Nepalgivenits diversity and a history of armed conflict and disasters.

While in the recent past Nepal has successfully managed a turbulent peace process, a great deal remains to be done to address the root causes of the conflict, injustices and inequalities, which can easily resurface in the wake of major societal shocks, such as the recent earthquake and the ongoing COVID crisis.

The concept of social cohesioncan be discussed primarily as the extent of trust in government as its vertical dimension and trustwithin society as its horizontal dimension which indicates the relationship between various social groups (religious, ethnicetc.). The Nepali word for social cohesion is samajiksadbhav:translated back into English it becomes 'social harmony', which however only emphasizes the horizontal dimension of the concept and misses the equally relevant vertical one.

The challenges of social cohesion in Nepal are emerging from this overlooking of the vertical dimension. On this premise, here I discuss some of the key social cohesion issues in Nepal that are surfacing now because of the COVID-19 crisis.

Returning labor migrants

Hundreds of thousands of jobless migrants will be returning home this year. They are coming back from India and other countries. Many others are moving to their homes from different cities within Nepal. Many of them are now facing stigma and discrimination in their communities. These challenges are compounded by the historical injustice and inequality as they are from lower economic background.

Just focusing on their livelihood recovery as a response to the crisis will not be enough. This will require integrating them into society and creating both social and economic interdependence in their communities to build back better as a more cohesive society. This will involve mainstreaming social cohesion and conflict sensitivity across humanitarian response plans and strengthening humanitarian, development and peace nexus.

Suspicion and fear towards other religious groups

While Nepali society in general is seen to be tolerant towards religious diversity, religious tensions in the past have at times turned violent. These kinds of crises and disasters fuel existing frustrations created from an unequal access to employment opportunities and meaningful civic engagement in social and governance structures. This exposes some of the communities and groups to discrimination. This also emerges from the lack of understanding and appreciation for each other's cultures, ways of life and world views.

Any solution to this should not only focus on mitigating hate speech and rumors in social media through messages of social harmony and tolerance but it also demands delving deep into the causes. The response to this will require measures such as integrating peace education into the school curriculum, community learning centers, and adult literacy programs and incorporating the idea of global citizenship as part of the national civic education programs.

Political culture and lack of trust

Looking back at 2013, the time of the elections for the second constituent assembly in Nepal, three kinds of conflicts were identified as being prevalent: political, resource-based and identity-based (PRI). The latter two categories of conflict subsided to a large extent after the promulgation of the constitution and implementation of federalism. The kind of political fragmentation and polarization of that time had decreased, and it was assumed that Nepal was experiencing the most peaceful time in its recent history.

However, there are rooms for improvement in the areas of internal democracy within parties and the 'political culture'in general in Nepal. Political culture is the acceptance of opposing viewpoints and acknowledging otherswho also need to be taken into confidence for better and inclusive governance. After the outbreak, there has been increasing global trend of consolidating more power by the state and decrease in the trust in the government. As the extent of trust in the government—the contract between the state and citizen—decreases, the questions arise on its capacity and intention to deliver on development or protecting its citizen from a pandemic or any disaster. The current situation underscores the need for increased support to dialogue facilities and multi-stakeholder forums if we are to foster the 'political culture' for a sustainable peace and development in Nepal.

Social distancing and social discrimination

The pandemic has made social distancing a catchphrase and an essential ingredient to deal with it. The social distancing though does not mean keeping away from social connections and bonding. It rather means physical distancing to limit the transmission of the virus in social interactions. However, when the social distancing measures are played out in countries like Nepal, where there is caste-based discrimination, its unintended connotation may resonate with already existing social distancing practices further re-enforcing and legitimizing the prevalent social, cultural and gender-based discriminations towards the marginalized population.

Furthermore, the economically disadvantaged groups will have to bear the burden more from the social distancing measures who will have fewer choices at their disposal. They are also becoming the victims of the new digital divide as the economy and services are more and more digitized. This perpetuates poverty, deepens inequality and runs the risk of exposing more people to social discrimination. This is another social cohesion challenge, which needs to be addressed through policy interventions that bridge the digital gap and make the digital connectivity and services accessible for all in the spirit of 'leaving no one behind'.

Social Entrepreneurship, Cov 19 and Rotary

Social entrepreneurs play the role of change agents in the social sector, by:

- Adopting a mission to create and sustain social value (not just private value),
- Recognizing and relentlessly pursuing new opportunities to serve that mission,
- Engaging in a process of continuous innovation, adaptation, and learning,
- Acting boldly without being limited by resources currently in hand, and
- Exhibiting a heightened sense of accountability to the constituencies served and for the outcomes created.

The closer a person gets to satisfying all these conditions, the more that person fits the model of a social entrepreneur. Those who are more innovative in their work and who create more significant social improvements will naturally be seen as more entrepreneurial

The COVID-19 pandemic(8 525 042confirmed cases, confirmed deaths 456 973) is exposing the systemic inequalities of our global economic system, and threatening progress towards equality and the advancement of human rights. The UN University estimated that the economic fallout could push an estimated half a billion people into poverty and take global development progress back three decades, primarily in emerging economies. In higher income countries, stimulus packages are unlikely to reach those already excluded from the economic mainstream. Last week, the International Labor Organization (ILO) warned that the steep decline in the ability to work and operate due to the pandemic is threating the livelihoods of 1.6 billion workers in the informal economy, almost half of the global workforce.

In this backdrop, The COVID-19 crisis illustrates the need for innovation from within companies by "social entrepreneurs." Social entrepreneurs use business to both generate profit and solve some of the world's most daunting social problems. Innovation takes many forms, and it's wonderful when insightful ideas can work to address global social issues created by Cov-19. Social entrepreneurs take the road less traveled to build flourishing hybrid businesses with triple-bottom lines. A new report from the Schwab Foundation for Social Entrepreneurship, Yunus Social Business and Porticus presents best practices from these employees who are working to address environmental or social problems. Beyond providing societal benefits, corporate social intrapreneurship motivates employees, increases innovation and incites corporate transformation.

Consider the Grameen Bank, a "social business" founded by Muhammad Yunus. Grameen was established to provide collateral-free microloans to the poorest of the poor in rural Bangladesh. Grameen now has over 8 million borrowers, and a 95% percent repayment rate. It is the first and only for-profit business to ever be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.Bill Drayton is recognized as one of the pioneering social entrepreneurs of our time. Drayton founded Ashoka: Innovators for the Public in 1981, which takes a multifaceted approach to finding and supporting social entrepreneurs globally. Drayton also serves as chair of the board for Get America Working! and

Youth Venture. "Yoga Girl" is the name of Rachel Brathen's New York Times best-selling book and the handle for her Instagram account, which reaches 2.1 million followers. In addition to showing her audience fresh yoga poses and tips, Rachel hopes to connect teachers with people in the online community who need healing. "What if social media could become a social mission?" asks Brathen. Her online channel oneoeight.tv was an "online studio" that offered health, yoga, and meditation services. Delancey Street Foundation. Founded as a nonprofit by Mimi Silbert and John Maher to help substance abusers and the homeless get back on their feet, Delancey Street accepts no government funding. More than 65% of their funds come from businesses run by the clients themselves: a moving company, restaurants, a print shop, and more. The businesses serve as vocational schools, teaching job skills to the clients. Over 14,000 people have turned their lives around at Delancey Street. Social entrepreneurs use business to both generate profit and solve some of the world's most daunting social problems. Innovation takes many forms, and it's wonderful when insightful ideas can work to address global social issues created by Cov-19. Social entrepreneurs take the road less traveled to build flourishing hybrid businesses with triple-bottom lines.

Social entrepreneurship is an innovative blend of social action and entrepreneurial strategies. These new enterprises take a variety of forms, and come in all sizes. Some are organized as forprofit businesses dedicated to social change. Others are nonprofit organizations paying their own way with income-earning enterprises. Still others are professionals in private practice who offer their services pro bono to people in need.

Rotary International is already helping to build sustainable communities through Social Enterprise linked to Rotary Clubs and in partnership with The Rotary Foundation, which empowers women and poor in their own community to build their own business to alleviate the cycle of chronic poverty of Cov-19 in different parts of the world.

घरबहालमा लिने व्यक्ति बिना सुचना तीन मिहना वा सोभन्दा बढी अविधसम्म घरबहाल रकम नबुभाई बेपत्ता भएमा र निजलाई सार्वजिनक रूपमा सुचना गर्दा वा निजको ठेगानामा पत्राचार गर्दा पिन फेला नपरेमा वा फेला परे पिन निज वा निजका कुनै हकवाला वा प्रितिनिधि उपस्थित नभएमा घरधनीले स्थानीय तहको सम्बन्धित वडा कार्यालयमा त्यस्तो व्यहोराको निवेदन दिनु पर्नेछ । यसरी प्राप्त निवेदन उपर सम्बन्धित वडा कार्यालयले बहालवालालाई पन्ध दिनको सार्वजिनक सुचना जारी गर्ने र त्यस्तो सुचनामा उपस्थित हुन नआएमा सम्बन्धित वडा कार्यालयले बहालमा रहेको घर खोली मालसामान आफ्नो वा कुनै मानिसको जिम्मा रहने गरी घर खाली गराउन सक्नेछ । बेपत्ता भएको मानिस छ मिहनाभित्र फर्की आएमा वा आफ्नो कुनै प्रितिनिधि पठाएमा सम्बन्धित वडा कार्यालयले बहाल वापतको बााकी रकम लिई मालसामान निजलाई फिर्ता दिनु पर्नेछ । स्थानीय तहको सम्बन्धित वडा कार्यालयमा निवेदन परे को एक मिहनाभित्र पिन त्यस्तो कार्यालयले कुनै कारबाही नगरेमा सम्बन्धित घरधनी आफौले सम्वन्धित वडा कार्यालय र निजकको प्रहरी कार्यालयमा निवेदन दिई प्रहरी कर्मचारी र कम्तीमा दुईजना स्थानीय व्यक्तिलाई साक्षी राखी लिखत खडा गरी घर खोली निजको मालसामान प्रहरीको जिम्मा दिइ घरधनीले घर खाली गराउन सक्ने कान्नी व्यवस्था छ ।

हदम्याद सम्बन्धी व्यवस्था :

घरबहालको काम कारबाहीबाट मर्का पर्ने व्यक्तिले काम कारबाही भए गरेको मितिले छ महिनाभित्र सम्बन्धित जिल्ला अदालतमा नालिस गर्न सक्नेछ ।

निष्कर्ष : नेपालका ठुला शहरहरुमा बहालमा बस्ने व्यक्तिहरुलाई राज्य एवं सरकारको तर्फबाट आवासको लागि बहालमा दिने गरी घर भवनहरु बनाई बहालमा दिने गरेको पर्याप्त अभ्यास पाइदैन । केवल छिटफुट रुपमा ठुला संघसंस्थाले व्यापारिक मल बनाई बहालमा दिने र केही निकायहरुले ससाना सटरहरुसमेत बनाई बहालमा लिनेदिने गरेका अभ्यास पाइन्छ । मलेसिया लगायतका केही विदे शी मुलुकहरुमा सरकारले नै बहालमा बस्ने व्यक्तिहरुलाई आवासहरु बनाई घरबहालमा लिनेदिने गरेको पाइन्छ । नेपालको सन्दर्भमा पिन नगरापालिकाहरु वा उपत्यका विकास प्राधिकरण वा नगर विकास समितिजस्ता संस्थाले भवनहरु बनाई नीजि आवासको लागि घरबहालमा दिने व्यवस्थाको नीति कमशः अवलम्बन गर्दै नजाने हो भने आगामी दिनमा काठमाडौं लगायतका ठुला शहरहरुमा घर बहालमा बस्नेका लागि ठुलो समस्या र चुनौतीको विषय बन्दै जाने देखिन्छ । हाल घरबहालसम्बन्धी कर स्थानीय तहले बहालरकमको ९० प्रतिशतबहाल करको रुपमा वार्षिक रुपमा लिने कानुनी व्यवस्था रहेको छ । कुनै व्यक्तिको घरबहालमात्र आम्दानीको स्रोत हुने व्यक्तिको एकल वा दम्पतीलाई आयकरमा कुनै छुट प्रदान नगरिएको र बिजुली महशुल, पानी महसुल र मर्मत खर्च समेत खर्च कटौ ती गर्न पाइने कानुनी व्यवस्था छैन । घरबहाल कर घरधनीले जेजित तिरेपिन हुने वा नितरे पिन हुने अवस्था रहेको हुादा घरबहाल कर पिन केही घटाई, बिजुली पानी महशुल र मर्मत खर्च समेत कट्टी गर्न पाउने र सम्पुण घरधनीहरुलाई घरबहालको दायरा भित्र ल्याउन् जररी छ ।

Menstrual Hygiene Management during Pandemics like COVID-19

Menstruation is a normal biological phenomenon and a key sign of reproductive health. Behavioral change on menstrual hygiene management (MHM) is required to ensure that every women and adolescence girls manage their period with dignity for which availability of menstrual products, privacy, WASH facilities along with proper disposal facility of used menstrual product is required. Along with the management of physical components required for hygienic menstruation, societal beliefs and cultural taboos surrounding the issue, poverty, and gender inequality obstruct for dignified and healthy management of menstruation.


Due to a lack of coping capacity, people from the poorest and disadvantaged communities are the ones highly vulnerable to the consequences of the epidemics on human health. During the pandemics, to cope and resist the chance of infection, special attention should be provided on a regular supply of clean water, soap, handwashing facility, and sanitation products. Though the direct or immediate impact of the COVID-19 has not been observed onthe menstrual cycle, indirect impacts are observed due to lack of proper health facilities, malnutrition, stress, anxiety, restrictions from activities (due to prevailing social stigmas) and lack of menstrual products during the lockdown. Since we don't have records of COVID-19 transmission through faces or blood along with menstrual blood, more attention should be provided on managing menstruation with dignity.

In the context of Nepalese society where discrimination of different forms during menstruation prevails even in the normal circumstances, special attention should be provided to the women and girls at home quarantine, quarantine camps, isolation wards, and hospitals. On the background where complaints and dissatisfaction on the management of basic facilities required at quarantine camps and isolation wards are being logged by citizens, social workers, civil society members, and health workers, attention on Menstrual Hygiene Management by government and service providers is ambiguous.

During Pandemic, women and girls at home may get a scarce supply of menstrual products along with other WASH products. Due to panic buying during a pandemic, materials get stock out resulting raise in price that can be unaffordable for underprivileged women and girls. To ensure the regular supply of menstrual products at an affordable price, government and related agencies should focus on the manufacturing and supply of menstrual products as an essential commodity. Individually one should not practice panic buying and buy responsibly, further, we should promote reusable materials like reusable cloth pads, menstrual cups, and period panties. Locally, with the support of local government and I/NGOs, community-based organizations can produce reusable cloth pads for distribution to needy one. Also, during pandemic access to health care centers will be disrupted, so to make girls and women aware of sexual and reproductive health, information's should be disseminated through broadcasting media, mobile, and telephone services.

In addition to the women and girls in the community, those at quarantine camps and other institutional settings like a prison, security personnel's camps, hostels, etc. should be considered for hygienic menstrual management during pandemics. At such camps, an adequate quantity of menstrual products should be made available. If a disposable sanitary pad is used, proper disposal sitesshould be allocatedwhere one can dispose of used pads with privacy and proper waste management system should be. Similarly, if reusable cloth pads are used, adequate water supply for washing and space for drying of the pad should be allocated. The proper facility for bathing and cleaning should be provisioned. Special attention for persons with disabilities should be provided and their needs and assistance required should be addressed on camps. Supply of Menstrual products at camps should be prioritized along with other hygiene products and regular





medical counseling and awareness should be provided to girls and women at camps. Facilities required for changing, cleaning, and washing is required.

Front line workers are likely to be severely impactedduring the pandemics like COVID-19. According to a study made by WHO across 104 countries in 2019, globally, 70 percent of the health workforce consists of women and most of them are the front line workers. This reveals the severity of the exposure of women during pandemics. In the context of COVID-19 where front line workers have to use Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for hours, managing menstruation hygienically with dignity is a challenge. So, the supply of enough quantity of PPE and high absorbent menstrual products for female healthcare workers should be ensured during pandemics. Proper WASH facilities within the hospitals for changing and cleaning along with proper counselingon MHM is required for both health care workers and patients.

To assure that everyone who menstruates gets their right for dignified menstruation during pandemics focus on the supply of menstrual products as NFI at the community, camps, and health care centers in affordable price is required. Since girls and women with disabilities are unable to manage their menstruation safely and are most vulnerable, special attention should be provided to persons with disabilities so that they can manage their menstruation with dignity. Also, prevailing social stigmas regarding menstruation can be a challenge for girls and women during menstruation so we all should work together to prevent the situation from getting worsen and make girls and women more vulnerable from COVID-19.

We Rotarians can join hands together with local government and other organizations to ease the life of adolescent girls and women during a pandemic by facilitating them to manage their menstruation with dignity.

EXPLORING DRUG DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

Have you ever looked at a capsule or tablet out of your medication and wondered how these miraculous things that can cure your disease are discovered and developed? As simple these medicines look, as complex is it's development process. Every drug we're consuming is a product of 7 to 12 years, sometimes even longer tiring years of research, design, development and approval process. Fascinating, isn't it? Before a drug can reach a patient, it must go through rigorous testing to determine whether it is safe, effective at treating the disease it was developed for and to ascertain the correct dose.

The key and first foremost step of drug development is discovery of promising compounds which can be used at medical treatment. Researchers discover new drug compounds through extensive study of disease and testing of several compounds. After the discovery process, the second step is preclinical research. Before testing drugs in people, researchers must find out whether it has the potential to cause serious harm. Therefore, it is tested on animals to explore the properties of drugs. Experiments are generally performed on rodents such as mice, rats, rabbits and then on larger animals such as cats, dogs, monkeys. As the evaluation progresses, unfavorable compounds get rejected at each step. While preclinical research answers the basic questions about drug's safety, it is not a substitute for studies of ways the drug will interact with the human body. So clinical research or trials are performed as the third step, in which experiment is done on people. All effects of drugs on the human body are noted. The clinical trial may last anywhere from 2 to 10 years, with the average being 5 years.

A New Drug Application (NDA) is submitted to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) after the investigation of the drug in clinical trial is complete and the drug is found to be safe and effective. With the application, the manufacturer submits all data collected concerning the drug during the clinical trials. A panel of experts, including pharmacologists, chemists, physicians, and other professionals, reviews the application and makes a recommendation to the FDA. The FDA then either approves or disapproves the drug for use. This process of review takes approximately 2 years. After FDA approval, the drug is finally launched and placed on market by manufacturer. Post-marketing safety surveillance, which is the final step of the drug development process is carried out after the manufacturer places drugs on the market. It is designed to evaluate the long term safety and efficacy of a drug on consumers and to understand real world problems with the drug formulation.

Generally out of 10,000 test compounds, only about 250 compounds are satisfiable enough to go for preclinical research. From this only less than five compounds are fit to go for clinical trials out of which approximately only one compound passes the trial and is approved by health authorities. The total cost of development of a single drug exceeds ten to hundreds of million US dollars. Thus development of a new drug is a very long and hectic process requiring a lot of knowledge, dedication and hard work however it's totally worth it since it is what it takes to cure disease and save millions of lives.

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
